- Willie Lewis Brown Jr. 90 y/o (born March 20, 1934) is an American politician. A member of the Democratic Party, he served as mayor of San Francisco from 1996 to 2004 (8 yr), the first African American to hold that office.
- He was elected to the California Assembly **in 1964**, during which he became popular in San Francisco and became known as one of the country's most powerful state legislators. As a legislator, Brown earned a reputation as a supporter of civil rights of gays and lesbians and was able to manage colleagues and maintain party discipline. He served as the Speaker of the California State Assembly from 1980 **to 1995**.

- His long tenure and powerful position were used as a focal point of the California ballot proposition limiting the terms of state legislators that passed in 1990.
- Harris did date San Francisco Mayor and State Assembly Speaker Willie Brown between 1994 to 1995. Brown appointed her to two posts — first to the California Unemployment Insurance Appeals Board, and then to the Medical Assistance Commission. Willie was married but separated at the time.
- *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*, a 1962 Novel and a 1975 American psychological drama film. It pitted 38-year old Randle McMurphy (JACK NICKELSON), previously on an Oregon work farm, is incarcerated for the statutory rape of a 15-year-old girl, and further arrests for other assault. ## **As a doctor I sneered at alternative medicine for years. But after some startling results, I've done a U-turn: PROFESSOR ROB GALLOWAY**

- I used to think that modern medicine was the saviour for all ills, and I was dismissive of people who said they'd benefited from alternative remedies such as acupuncture.

I'd quietly snigger under my breath when a patient told me how yoga, rather than sertraline, was helpful for their stress. And sneer at those who took vitamins or supplements for this or that.

- Last month, a study was published in the highly respected journal JAMA Network Open, which showed how effective acupuncture can be for helping patients with Parkinson's to sleep. (Two in three patients suffer from insomnia.)

In the study, patients at the Guangzhou University Hospital in China were given either acupuncture or sham acupuncture (using needles that do not penetrate the skin).

After four weeks of treatment, those given real acupuncture had significantly better sleep. The effect lasted for another four weeks after that.

- There is evidence that it can be effective in treating gastro- intestinal pain, migraine and menopausal symptoms.

Crucially, it could also treat chronic pain, such as back pain, which I — like millions of others — suffer from, and for which there is little available in terms of effective treatments.

- Of course, we have to remember a herb is a herb until it is proven to have a medical benefit — and then it's called a drug.

For example, digoxin and aspirin are lifesaving medications, but were originally derived from the foxglove plant and willow bark, respectively.

## **Our colon cancers were dismissed as 'anxiety' and 'allergies' - the delayed diagnoses mean we'll die from the disease**

- Take home , change in bowel habits, work it up
- and some women are considered 'anxious' from having almost no symptoms at all. Amy Lentz of Washington state noticed that her stool was slightly looser than normal. She had to wait a year and a half for a colonoscopy, which confirmed terminal colon cancer.
- Raquel Aguilar, 33, of California, suffered severe diarrhea off and on for three years that included blood in her stool. Yet doctors referred her to a psychologist instead of ordering additional tests.

## **Innovative Cancer Therapies for 2024**

### **REPURPOSED MEDICATIONS**

Repurposed medications use old, off-patent drugs to target cancer in innovative ways. Although not new to medicine, this approach has gained traction in oncology due to lower development costs and shorter approval



times compared to new drugs. The concept gained widespread recognition in 2014 with the Repurposing Drugs in Oncology (ReDO) project.

“Repurposed medications are not a cure for cancer or a replacement for conventional therapies. They are valuable adjuncts to the stacking of therapies in a precise manner,” explains Dr. Goodyear. These medications can target specific cancer pathways effectively, providing additional support to traditional treatments.

For example, drugs such as Celebrex, ivermectin, low-dose naltrexone, and Mebendazole are now being used to target critical pathways in cancer cells, including those involved in the progression of cancers like breast cancer with brain metastasis.

Metformin, originally for Type 2 diabetes, and aspirin, known for pain relief, have mechanisms that help inhibit cancer cell growth and induce apoptosis.

Repurposed medications have shown promise in targeting cancer cells using advanced techniques that study genes, proteins, and other biological factors. Dr. Goodyear says significant research supports their success. However, their use must be carefully managed to ensure effectiveness and avoid the pitfalls of a “throw everything at the wall” approach.

## **Bilateral Mastectomy Reduces Cancer Risk Without Improving Survival Rates: Study**

- New research shows that while bilateral mastectomy lowers the risk of cancer in the opposite breast, it doesn't improve overall survival rates. This finding may influence decisions for women with unilateral breast cancer, challenging the notion that more aggressive surgery yields better long-term outcomes.

- researchers at the Women's College Hospital in Toronto investigated the long-term effects of different surgeries for women with cancer in one breast. They aimed to determine if bilateral mastectomy (removal of both breasts) offers a survival advantage over lumpectomy (removal of tumor and small surrounding area) or unilateral mastectomy (removal of one breast).
  - Using data from a large cancer registry, the study focused on women diagnosed with early to mid-stage breast cancer in one breast from 2000 to 2019.
  - Participants were tracked for 20 years to monitor the development of cancer in the opposite breast and breast cancer mortality. Researchers also collected data on treatments such as chemotherapy and radiotherapy.
  - During the 20-year period, 766 women with lumpectomies, 728 with unilateral mastectomies, and 97 with bilateral mastectomies developed cancer in the opposite breast. Women with bilateral mastectomies had a much lower risk of developing cancer in the opposite breast, with only 1 out of 370 affected, compared to about 1 out of 15 with lumpectomies and 1 out of 50 with unilateral mastectomies.
